You may have heard the news that there has been a statewide increase in the number of drivers passing stopped school buses with flashing red lights. Not only is this against the law, but it is extremely dangerous for our students' safety.

When you are on the road, please keep in mind that a bus with yellow flashing lights is coming to a stop and traffic should slow down. When the red lights are on and the stop sign is out, the bus is stopped to load or unload students. It is never safe to pass a bus with flashing red lights. I thank everyone for using safe driving practices around our school buses and ask that community members remind any new teenage drivers about these laws.

Byron-Bergen buckles up, every trip, every time

Byron-Bergen students up through sixth grade are now being reminded by their bus driver to buckle up. Every trip. Every time. This new bus safety initiative comes as New York State legislators work to mandate seat belt use for all students.

"The bottom line is that we want our students to be as safe as possible," said Elementary School Principal Brian Meister. "We consulted with area districts currently requiring seat belt use and their results have been overwhelmingly positive."

The Transportation Department was provided seat belt training during annual school bus safety training at the beginning of the school year. Seat belt signs are on display on every school bus and parents and guardians of Elementary School students have been asked to talk to their children about the importance of seat belts.

"Many of our students understand the connection between seat belts in cars and seat belts on buses," said Elementary School Assistant Principal Betsy Brown. "During our Bus Safety meetings in September, one first grade student shared with his classmates, 'I wear my seat belt in my mom's car every time, so I should wear it on the bus too!""

College and Career Counselor honored with national award

On Saturday, September 28, 2019, Byron-Bergen College and Career Counselor Rob Kaercher accepted the Rising Star Award from the National Association for College Admissions Counselors at their annual conference in Louisville, Kentucky. This national award "honors individuals and programs that exemplify excellence and dedication to serving the needs of students in the transition from high school to college."

Kaercher's position has many aspects from exposing students to a variety of job experiences to helping them complete their college applications. "I try to help them find a career path that matches their interests," said Kaercher. "I have college and career assessment tools to help with this, but talking to the individual students, reflecting on what brings their interests and what they enjoy in their classes, is the best way. Each student is different. It's all about personalized attention."

When asked why Byron-Bergen stood out in the nation-wide competition, Kaercher replied, "It's visionary for a small, rural school to have a College and Career Counselor. This position is much more prevalent at private schools, prep schools, and in large, urban districts that have created a college going culture. Byron-Bergen is somewhat unique in that my colleagues in the Counseling Department can focus on the social and emotional development of our students and I can focus on helping with the transition out of high school. I hope that we continue to see more rural schools, and schools in general, see the importance of developing a College and Career Center to enhance the school counseling department."

Another difference between Byron-Bergen and larger districts is the variety of career paths students are interested in. "This award highlights the transition of students from high school to college, but every year I help students transition to four-year colleges, two-year colleges, military careers, and many students enter directly into the work force. Each of these students are valuable and I hope that I can help them leave high school ready to fulfill their goals."

"We are extremely lucky to have Rob on our team," said Byron-Bergen High School Principal Pat McGee. "It's not enough just to have a College and Career Center. It needs to be in the hands of a dedicated professional counselor with the knowledge, connections, and passion for helping students map out their futures. This is a well-deserved honor."

The District transitions to a new School Resource Officer

After five years with Byron-Bergen Central Schools and 22 years with the Genesee County Sheriff's Department, Deputy Matt Butler is retiring. As the District's first School Resource Officer, Butler focused on building relationships with students of all ages.

"I wanted to be an SRO because, as a Sheriff Deputy, I rarely had positive interactions with young people or families," said Butler. "I wanted a change, to make a positive impact on kids. I can't remember a time in my 17 years in the Sheriff's Department that I high-fived a kid. Here, it's every day. It's really rewarding. I'm going to miss the kids – the young ones and the older ones. Just talking to them. Safety is obviously my first priority, but a huge part of this job is building relationships with the students. I'll miss that."

In retirement, Butler and his family are relocating to South Carolina where he will spend a lot of time being a dad and playing golf. Butler will continue to work in the District until the winter holiday break. During that time, he will help the District transition to the new SRO, Deputy Rich Schildwaster. As a Byron-Bergen alumnus, Schildwaster is looking forward to his return to the school District. He is eager to continue building the relationship that has been established within the community through the SRO Program.

Schildwaster has been with the Genesee County Sheriff Office since 2015. He is a DRE (Drug Recognition Expert), a member, of the Crash Management Team and a CRASE Instructor (Civilian Response to Active Shooter Events). Schildwaster is a United States Navy Veteran. While enlisted, he held the positions of Mechanic, Military Police, and Recruiter; wherein he was stationed in Virginia Beach, Virginia and Sicily, Italy. Deputy Schildwaster attended Genesee Community College for studies in Criminal Justice.
