Siomara Caballero Valedictorian

Siomara Caballero is treasurer of the National Honor Society, Jr. Teller for the school's branch of the Tonawanda Valley Federal Credit Union, and a member of Spanish Club. She is also a member of PageTurners, which has advanced to the regional championship for the past two years, winning it in 2019. She is a member of Math League; where she was awarded Highest Scoring Freshman, has been

a regional representative for the past four years and a state representative for the past three years, and the team as a whole placed first in the league twice in the last four years. Siomara is co-captain of the Varsity Cross Country team for which she has earned two sectional patches, is a four-time Genesee Region All-Star, All Greater Rochester Honorable Mention, and Most Valuable Runner for her team. She has also played on the Varsity Basketball team for two years. She rounds out her year running for the Varsity Track team; where she is a three-time Genesee Region All-Star and All Greater Rochester Honorable Mention, she has been named her team's Most Improved, Most Respected, and Most Valuable track athlete throughout her career. And it was hard. All of those things were very hard. Now, I want to tell you why all of those things are so important.



Denise Baker is retiring from Byron-Bergen Central School District after 33 years. The quote that best describes her years of service is from Winnie the Pooh. Baker was hired by former Superintendent Bill Hayes as an elementary Special Education teacher. Retired Principal Thomas Biondolillo assigned her as a Consultant Teacher for English Language Arts and Math to grades three and four. While at Byron-Bergen, she also taught Kindergarten, first and second grades and the Wilson Reading Program for the last ten years.

"I was fortunate to have taught with a plethora of dedicated teachers, worked with an incredible support staff, enriched the lives of numerous wonderful children, appreciated our



conscientious custodial people, and was grateful for the continual support and opportunities of our administration. I have maintained lifetime friendships with colleagues and parents through the years."

Elementary School NEWS

2020 will be a year we never forget. Never before have we experienced a global pandemic that resulted in such a long closure of school, while at the same time limiting so much of the positive personal interactions children enjoy outside of school. I am extremely grateful for the hard work and many efforts made by our faculty and staff to stay connected with our students and families. These past few months have shown us

that technology can be used to provide and support learning; however, it also showed us that the extent and effectiveness of distance learning cannot match that of teachers working closely and in proximity to students.

I would also like to thank our parents, families, and community for supporting and partnering with us to ensure that these past three months remained positive and productive through this time. It was wonderful to see families and students drive through for supply pick up, lunch pick up, and of course our District-wide parade. It is often said that education is a partnership between parents and school. That was true this year more than ever.

Each year I send out information regarding academic regression or what is often known as "the summer slide." Research has shown that students who are not engaged in regular reading practices and literacy rich activities for a sustained period of time encounter a stagnation or decline in their reading skills. We typically see these students fall 1-3 reading levels during July and August. This drop in reading level means that the first few weeks of school is spent re-teaching skills and strategies to regain the prior year's proficiency. This year, with school closing on March 13th, we may see even larger drops in reading levels requiring much longer for students to catch up.

Fortunately, there are ways that families can reduce the impact of summer regression. Keep your kids reading throughout the summer and read with them whenever possible. I know first-hand how busy summer can be with kids and their many activities. So here are a few suggestions to be sure to keep them reading.

- Read at the same time each day. Perhaps it's story time before bed or set the timer for 15 minutes first thing in the morning. Kids thrive on routine.
- 2. Make it a manageable timeframe 10-20 minutes is plenty.
- Choose books or articles that are familiar and enjoyable.
 The goal is not to challenge them with more complicated texts that will frustrate them but rather to allow them to practice their skills on resources that are motivating and accessible.
- 4. If the book is frustrating, read it to them. Listening to fluent readers helps students with their fluency.
- 5. Let them read articles and stories online. Just be certain to monitor their online use.
- 6. Most importantly, have fun.

In terms of math, I recommend including math practice into your daily routine. Flash cards are a great way to practice math facts. We are expecting to keep our online programs such as IXL active for all students to practice with and there are many free and fun math programs out there. Your child's teacher can share which ones are most appropriate for your child.

As we head into the most unusual start to a summer, I'd like to remind parents that there is much to learn in the summer months. I encourage parents to spend time with their children and talk about anything and everything. After a long day of play, ask them what they did, why they did it, and what they liked best. These conversations strengthen loving relationships and help students learn valuable communication skills.

I would once again like to thank all of the families and friends of Byron-Bergen Elementary for their ongoing support of our students and school. Have a great summer. I look forward to seeing you in the fall.




