| President's Report: | D. List welcomed the students and families and thanked them for coming<br>to the meeting. The GVSBA Legislative Breakfast is January 21, 2023 and<br>will be held in York. T. Menzie and D. List met with Members Voice and<br>everything is going well. D. List thanked C. Stehm for filling in until a new<br>principal was chosen and for helping keep the Elementary going forward.   |
| Academic Focus:     | C. Schroth and several of his 5 <sup>th</sup> grade students presented on what they<br>have been working on in IBL (Inquiry-Based Learning). This is the 8 <sup>th</sup> year<br>Craig has been able to do this program for students in grades K-5.<br>Students discussed the Engineering Design Process and then they talked<br>about "Design Thinking" where designing and creating something with<br>the user in mind. They ask themselves questions like:<br>Does it work well?<br>Does it meet their needs?  |

| Business<br>Administrator<br>Comments:                | L. Prinz provided the 2022-2023 Budget Calendar. Included in New<br>Business, is a refund to a property owner for a missed exemption. A<br>Multi-Year Purchasing Agreement (MYPA) to allow the school to purchase<br>25 ViewSonic Interactive Boards for instruction. The school received<br>approval for the 2021 Capital Project plans from New York State. Bid<br>packets were prepared and sent out for the bid opening on<br>January 10, 2023 at 3:00 p.m. Four contracts were able to be taken out<br>of the bid process and be awarded separately as the companies are on<br>New York State Contract. This allows the school to contract with them<br>Directly if the Boards authorizes. These four contracts are up for<br>approval under New Business. |

## Superintendent's Comments:

P. McGee stated that the Strategic Plan video will be ready for release after the winter break. NYSSBA is taking action to help support a statewide, permanent free school meals for all program. He read a statement on the teacher and staff shortages in New York State and the concern he has with that at Byron-Bergen. This continues to be an issue that New York State fails to address. The shortage of highly qualified job candidates poses a serious threat to our ability to remain academically competitive. This shortage was due in large part to the public relations efforts of the former administration to discredit the teaching profession and public schools in general. In addition, the policies of the former administration unfairly tied teacher evaluation to student performance on statewide exams without regard to schools' geographic region or socio-economic demographics. These influences dissuaded counselors, teachers and parents from encouraging young people to seriously consider the teaching profession. Further complicating the shortage are bureaucratic hurdles to teacher certification, comparatively low salaries, shrinking benefits, costs of college tuition and obstacles to certification reciprocity with other states. With educators and education under attack, a complex education bureaucracy and little hope of prosperity for new teachers, the teacher shortage is no surprise. Critical support staff, the lifelines of our day-to-day operations, are

becoming increasingly scarce. There is a national shortage of school bus drivers that rural schools in New York experience acutely. The process required for earning a CDL in New York is especially cumbersome. Increased student needs and special education services require more teacher aides and assistants. Food service workers can earn more at fast food restaurants. Cleaners, maintenance workers and other staff can do better at big-box stores. There are fewer individuals available to do this important work and local capacities to compete with the private sector will be more challenging in the absence of increased aid to schools. We need some help from our government to help us with these shortages. He thanked both Carol Stehm and Bill Forsyth for all they have done for the school and wished them luck in their future endeavors.
