Female students take top honors at National Geographic Geography Bee

The 100 top School Champions will head to Albany for the competition in March.

"Every year the Byron-Bergen Elementary School Champion and Runner-Up have been boys," said Bee Coordinator and Fifth Grade Teacher Ken Rogoyski. "The last time a girl won the National Championship was 26 year ago, in 1993. New York State has never had a female State Championship since the Bee started in 1989. Perhaps that will change this year. I'm very excited for Allison and Libby."

Sixth grader Jackson Lundfelt and eighth grader Jack Benstead finished in the 2nd Place Runner-Up positions. Both students performed exceptionally well during the competition.

Allison and Libby will take the New York State Bee Qualifying Test.

The 100 top School Champions will head to Albany for the state competition in March.



B-B Buildings and Grounds

What does it take to keep 100 acres of grounds and 265,000 square feet of buildings fully functional? Ask Roger Caldwell.

Caldwell has been the Director of Facilities for two years but he has an 18-year history with the District's Buildings and Grounds Department. His team of 20 staff work hand-in-hand with all of the District's departments, from the Superintendent on down, to make everyday activities possible.

They ensure a clean and safe school environment as well as facilitate school and community events.

"We are definitely team oriented," says Caldwell. "I can't do this by myself. I need every single person."

The Buildings and Grounds responsibilities encompass a wide range of tasks including plumbing, HVAC, electrical, plowing, landscaping, custodial work, and maintaining the pool and athletic facilities. In addition to the day-to-day, the Buildings and Grounds staff support major initiatives like the Capital Project.

"It's an ongoing conversation with construction management and the architect. Before the contractors can do their job, we have to do ours. My team moves all the furniture and equipment to safe locations for storage. Then, the rooms have to be prepared before returning everything. For major projects like that, it's all hands on deck."

"We are lucky to have such a dedicated staff," says Superintendent Mickey Edwards. "I am always proud to invite guests to our facilities. Thank you, to Roger and his staff, for all of their hard work."

Byron-Bergen Art Students Think Outside the Paint Box

Byron-Bergen Jr./Sr. High Art Teacher Sandy Auer approached Principal Pat McGee with a request. She wanted to shake up the visual arts curriculum. The result of that conversation is the new Eclectic Arts program, now in its first year.

This full-year course gives students an opportunity to explore a variety of arts experiences, media, and concepts not typically available in traditional art classes. Students experiment with papermaking, bookbinding, textile arts, upcycling, mixed media art, and multi-cultural and anthropological art exploration.

"Drawing, painting, and sculpture are fundamental to the visual arts, but there are so many techniques and combinations to explore," said Auer. "The skills my students are learning will not only provide them with new ways to express themselves creatively, but also new ways of interpreting the visual world."

Among the projects Auer's students have undertaken this year are weaving on nontraditional looms, mixed media textile painting, acrylic pour painting, and creative collaborations with Elementary School students.

"Mrs. Hill's UPK class drew pictures of monsters and talked to our class about them. Acting as commissioned artists, the Eclectic Art students created finished compositions to bring the younger students' visions to life. It was a very fun project for both classes and it gave the older students an idea of what it is like to work with a client."



Auer also has a large-scale collaboration lined up for the spring."We are working with local mural artist David Burke to paint the hallway entrance to the science wing. Our class submitted design ideas to Principal McGee and, together, we chose the design most suited to the space and project purpose."

The Eclectic Art class took their study of art and techniques out of the classroom to the Memorial Art Gallery and the George Eastman House this November. Both collections include a mix of historic and contemporary works.

"A solid field trip reinforces and supplements classroom concepts as it introduces students to places and ideas that might not normally cross their paths," said Marlene Hamann-Whitmore, the McPherson Director of Academic Programs at the Memorial Art Gallery. "Everyone learns differently, and a field trip offers opportunities for individualized discovery within an engaging social setting."

"It's wonderful for the students to see the evolution of the media," added Auer. "My students were asked to pay particular attention to pieces utilizing mixed media, especially textiles. They were very impressed with the work of artist Esther Nisenthal whose autobiographical embroidery pieces tell the story of her holocaust survival. It was wonderful that they were able to experience such powerful visual expression using techniques we have been learning in class."

In and out of the classroom, these students are growing as artists. "I really enjoy this class. I love expressing my creativity and trying so many new techniques and materials. It's a lot of fun!" said 11th grade Eclectic Art student Rose Hubbard.

Auer started teaching in Byron-Bergen in 1997. Over the years, she has taught 5th-12th grades. She also teaches Pottery and Adapted Arts for student with special needs.

Students wishing to enroll in Eclectic Arts will have to first complete a studio art elective or gain teacher permission. The class rotates annually with Sculpture.

Parents that have already contacted the Elementary School by phone will still need to send in a letter to be eligible for UPK. Please note that if we receive more than our allowed capacity, we will select students using a lottery system.

What are the Program Goals of the UPK at Byron-Bergen?

- To meet the NYS learning standards by using a curriculum that is thematically based and supported using literature, songs, and exploration.
- To foster an environment that promotes happy, confident children who are willing to take risks, make independent choices, and ask questions.
- To create an inclusive community that builds upon the student's strengths and accommodates their needs

Philosophy of UPK

The UPK program at Byron-Bergen is focused on socialization, learning through play, and self-exploration. Children learn through a hands-on learning environment that includes activities, learning centers, concrete materials, and manipulatives. Students learn through a nurturing environment that is enriching, challenging, and developmentally appropriate.



KINDERGARTEN REGISTRATION REMINDER

Children who will be five years of age, on or before December 1, 2019, are eligible for entrance to Kindergarten in September of 2019. New families in the school district should notify the school if they have a child that will enter Kindergarten in September of 2019. Parents may contact the Byron-Bergen Elementary School Office by calling 494-1220, ext. 1301. Information may also be sent to the Byron-Bergen Elementary School, 6971 West Bergen Road, Bergen, New York 14416.

All children registering for Kindergarten will be scheduled for a screening appointment this summer. The results of this screening will be used to plan for the 2019-2020 Kindergarten Program.

The following items are necessary to complete the registration process:

- 1. Your child's Birth Certificate.
- 2. Certificate of Immunization— New York State law requires that every child entering school must have received a minimum of 5 doses of diphtheria-pertussis-tetanus vaccine (DPT) and 4 doses of polio (IPV) vaccine, 2 doses of MMR (measles, mumps, rubella), 3 doses of Hepatitis B, and 2 doses of varicella (chickenpox). Those children born on or after 1/1/2008 must have 4 doses of Pneumococcal Conjugate Vaccine (PCV). Their immunizations must be completed prior to entering school.
- 3. Proof of Residency— If this is the first time you have a child entering Byron-Bergen Central School District, please bring proof of residency to your screening appointment. This can be a copy of your mortgage statement, rental/lease agreement or a copy of your tax bill.

Byron-Bergen students use engineering principles to break rubber band car world record

Many people dream of joining the ranks of record-holders in the Guinness Book of World Records. Though most of these dreams go unrealized, Craig Schroth's students are using engineering skills to earn Guinness recognition.

Schroth, a STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts, and mathematics) lab teacher at Byron-Bergen Elementary School, challenged his sixth grade students to use simple machines -a wheel and axle- to build vehicles powered only by a wound up rubber band. Students used three class periods to methodically make changes and improve their designs.

"We moved the rubber band further forward," explained sixth grade student Adam Piper. "Then we added more rubber bands because the more we could wind it up, the further (the car) would go."

In addition to the number of rubber bands, the design team added bigger wheels wrapped in rubber bands for increased road friction and elongated the distance between axles.



On November 9, the team of Noah Clare, Logan Fregoe, Ian Pulcini, and Adam Piper broke the standing World Record with a run of 1,071 cm. According to the Guinness website, the current record for distance traveled by a rubber band car is 895 cm and was set on July 13, 2015.

"This STEAM design challenge not only involved real-world problem solving within the physical sciences, but it also included improving their design by collecting data through trial and error," explained Schroth. "Most groups

were able to improve on their personal best of distance traveled by utilizing the engineering design process. All of the participating classes did a great job."

Inspired by the sixth grade success, the fifth grade team of Carter Kuipers and Kendall Pape surpassed the previous winning distance by an additional 228 cm on November 15, 2018 making 1,299 cm the longest distance achieved.

Schroth has contacted the Guinness organization to have the distances submitted for official approval. All of the participating students eagerly await a response.
