

## **Pesticide Notice**

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation enacted a program that requires all schools to provide you with information about pesticide product applications made throughout the school year. Under State law, the school is required to maintain a list of parents, guardians, and staff who wish to receive 48-hour advance written notice prior to a pesticide application. The following pesticide applications are not subject to prior notification requirements:

- · A school remains unoccupied for a continuous 72-hours following an application;
- · Anti-microbial products;
- · Nonvolatile rodenticides in tamper resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children;
- · Silica gels and other nonvolatile ready-to-eat pastes, forms, or gels in areas inaccessible to children;
- Boric acid and disodium octaborate tetrahydrate:
- The application of EPA designated biopesticides;
- The application of EPA designated exempt materials under 40CFR.25;
- The use of aerosol products with a directed spray in containers of 18 fluid ounces or less when used to protect individuals.

In the event that an emergency application is necessary to protect against an imminent threat to human health, a good faith effort will be made to supply written notification to those on the 48-hour prior notification list. To register your name with the school to be on a 48-hour notification list, send a request to Byron-Bergen Central School District Office, 6917 W Bergen Rd., Bergen, NY 14416. A written request must be submitted annually.

Thank you to all of the family members who took the time to fill out our Parent Survey earlier in the year. Your insightful thoughts have been very helpful when discussing important topics with our administration and faculty. Similar to our Student Surveys, in the month of June we will be hosting a small Parent Focus Group to gather more information revolving around the survey responses. Invites were sent to anyone who expressed interest in their survey. This feedback will be discussed when our District-Level SEL Team meets in June to plan for the upcoming school year.

One of our most exciting new additions to Byron-Bergen is our Therapy Dog Program. For the past four months, we have been piloting different ways to utilize Therapy Dogs at B-B. - Choose books or articles that are familiar and enjoyable. The goal is not to challenge them with more complicated texts that will frustrate them, but rather to allow them to practice their skills on resources that are motivating and accessible. Consider visiting the local library to find some new books to read.
- If the book is frustrating, read it to them. Listening to fluent readers helps students with their fluency.
- For math, it is recommended to include fact practice into your daily routine. Flash cards are a great way to practice math facts. We are expecting to keep IXL and some of our other online programs active for students to practice. There are also many other free and fun math programs. Your child's teacher can share which ones are most appropriate for your child.
- Most importantly, have fun!
