## **Science Olympiad**

Fresh from their triumphant first year, the Junior High School Science Olympiad team is gearing up for their second season. The team consists of sixth through ninth grade students and is broken down into 18 event groups, each assigned a task to complete within the fields of physics, chemistry, and biology. This task might be mechanical, like building a catapult, or academic, like learning to identify bird species native to New York.

Returning to the team are 8<sup>th</sup> grade Eala Coniglio and 9th-graders Rena Wilson and Hannah Reidmiller. Last year Eala competed in forestry identification and the "sounds of music" in which the team built an instrument and performed a song on it. Rena and Hannah teamed up on several tasks including the roller coaster build, solar system, meteorology, and "Fast Facts" which is a science terminology lightning round.

"It was great to expand our knowledge of various topics in science and gain an understanding of topics we might not learn about in class," said Rena. "It's also fun and it was cool to do well in competition." "We saw a gap between the Elementary School STEAM Lab and the High School Tech Wars," said Junior High School Science Teacher and Science Olympiad Advisor Terry Vick. "We started the team from scratch last year and came in seventh place out of 23 teams and brought back 21 medals, which was amazing. This year we're hoping to be even better prepared."



Kaercher held meetings with all students about Core Values in the Cafeteria. We were also fortunate to bring each bus together with their bus driver for a bus meeting to discuss how we all need to follow Core Values and look out for each other since the bus is a community in itself! We have had two full school Social Emotional Learning Assemblies (SEL) this year in September and October. # **Pesticide Notice**

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation enacted a program that requires all schools to provide you with information about pesticide product applications made throughout the school year. Under State law, the school is required to maintain a list of parents, guardians, and staff who wish to receive 48-hour advance written notice prior to a pesticide application. The Following pesticide applications are not subject to prior notification requirements:

- A school remains unoccupied for a continuous 72-hours following an application;
   Anti-microbial products;
- · Nonvolatile rodenticides in tamper resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children;
- · Silica gels and other nonvolatile ready-to-eat pastes, forms, or gels in areas inaccessible to children;
- · Boric acid and disodium octaborate tetrahydrate;
- The application of EPA designated biopesticides;
- The application of EPA designated exempt materials under 40CFR.25;
- The use of aerosol products with a directed spray in containers of 18 fluid ounces or less when used to protect individuals.

In the event that an emergency application is necessary to protect against an imminent threat to human health, a good faith effort will be made to supply written notification to those on the 48-hour prior notification list. To register your name with the school to be on a 48-hour notification list, send a request to Byron-Bergen Central School District Office, 6917 W Bergen Rd., Bergen, NY 14416. A written request must be submitted annually.

Fire Gafet

Friday, October 13th was Fire Safety Day at Byron-Bergen Elementary School. Emergency responders from Bergen, Byron, and South Byron Fire Departments spent the morning showing rescue vehicles, equipment, and fire safety practices to students in Pre-K through



grade 5. Students learned to stay low, feel closed doors with the back of their hands, and how to get a fire fighter's attention if they cannot get out of a building.

Also on the scene were several Byron-Bergen High School students who participate in the Bergen Fire Department Explorers program. Eleventh grade participant Lea Donofrio is part of the third generation of emergency volunteers. "I grew up wearing (Bergen Fire Department) shirts and riding the fire trucks in parades," said Lea.

"I don't think we have any explorers in the program who aren't second or third generation fire fighters," said Lea's mother, Julie Donofrio. "They all grew up doing this. So, this is normal. This is their family, too."

The Explorer program is part of a larger nation-wide effort to bolster emergency volunteer participation. Thank you to all the student and adult emergency responders who took the time to educate the community about fire safety and who work to protect the community every day.



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
