District Receives \$25,000 America's Farmers Grow Rural Education Grant

Two years of hard work are paying off for High School Science Teacher Jeffrey Parnapy and his colleagues in the form of a \$25,000 grant from America's Farmers Grow Rural Education. The grant money will be used to purchase data collection instruments for 7th through 12th grade science classes and to bolster the newly established agriculture program, now in its second year.

The school was nominated by several local farmers for the grant, which is designated to support STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math) programs in rural public school districts. Mr. Parnapy, who teaches biology and agriculture, spearheaded the grant proposal with help from his science colleagues Michael Conine, Briana Delvecchio, Jenifer Faro, Peter Spence, and Terry Vick. The grant money will benefit all of the science classes by providing a range of specialized equipment including meteorological instruments and soil and water analysis equipment.

"We are so excited to be receiving the \$25,000 America's Farmers Grow Rural Education Grant," said Jr./Sr. High School Principal Patrick McGee. "A huge thank you to our Ag and Science teacher Mr. Parnapy for doing the leg work behind the scenes to win this grant. Last year we started an initiative to bring an Agriculture program back into our building. We established an Agriculture elective and started FFA (Future Farmers of America). This year we will offer two Ag classes and our FFA program continues to grow. The grant money will go a long way into providing even more resources and opportunities for our students in the coming years."









Many people over the years have asked what it takes to be a school bus driver. Here is the process each and every school bus driver in NYS goes through to become, and then maintain their license to drive a bus.

- Be a minimum of 21 years old
- Have three verifiable references and full background check
- Have a clean NYS driver's license history abstract

To obtain a commercial driver's license:

- General knowledge test (written)
- Air brake test (written)

Once all of the above is cleared, the following must be done before driving:

- A physical performance test, in order to be physically fit to perform all driving skills
- A 3-hour pre-service course outlining the job expectations

Once licensed and driving, the following must be done to keep current:

- Yearly health physicals
- Yearly license review (most schools subscribe to daily license alerts)
- Annual defensive driving test with students.
- Biennial full commercial road test
- Biennial written exam with 30 random NYS DMV questions

- Be able to pass a health physical, eye and hearing test.
- A complete drug and alcohol test
- · Be fingerprinted with no past legal issues
- School passenger test (written)
- 1-Hour road test in a bus
- District training that allows the new driver to know their expectations
- Biennial physical performance test
- Random drug and alcohol testing
- Must take a NYS 30-hour Bus Driver course within one year of starting
- Semi-annual 2-hour NYS refresher course
- Three safety drills with evacuation of students from bus

Most schools employ a licensed NYS 19-A examiner to perform most of the above driver regulations.

Pesticide Notice

Under State law, the school is required to maintain a list of parents, guardians, and staff who wish to receive 48-hour advance written notice prior to a pesticide application. To register your name with the school to be on a 48-hour notification list, send a request to Byron-Bergen Central School District Office, 6917 W Bergen Rd., Bergen, NY 14416. A written request must be submitted annually.


These special programs are in addition to the regular counseling services. Mrs. Gina Henry, our Prevention Needs Educator provides evidence based programming, education, and resources to help students.

College & Career Preparation
