SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Byron-Bergen Community,

As we head into the spring season, I'd like to thank our parents and community for their support of our many programs that take place throughout the year. Also, a reminder: concerts, musicals, athletic events, and more will be occurring between now and the end of the school year. Please consider attending these events as a way to support our students and our schools. These dates can be found on

the district's calendar posted on our website.

As superintendent, I have the opportunity to visit and spend time in each of our schools, witnessing the powerful instruction and learning occurring in our classrooms on a daily basis. Our schools have a warm, caring, childcentered atmosphere that fosters deep thinking, stretching our students to acquire new information in an engaging way. There are amazing things happening right now, in our schools and our classrooms.

We have emphasized the importance and improvement of technology in both of our schools, placing new equipment in the hands of our staff and students so that they have the tools needed for a relevant 21st-century education. One of the ways we are doing this is through our use of Video Instructional Coaching (VIC).VIC gives the teachers and their coach a perspective on the classroom that cuts through perceptual errors and allows teachers the opportunity to continually improve on their delivery of instruction. Currently, approximately 80 percent of

our teachers are using Video Instructional Coaching. It's easy and powerful, and once a teacher starts to use it they may wonder how they ever made progress without it.



Our schools are a primary resource for our children, offering continuity, safety, information, and support for their growth and success. Many students at Byron-Bergen turn to trusted teachers or other school professionals for support and help in understanding challenging events in their lives. School personnel are often a front-line resource for children experiencing, trauma, illness, death and loss—both at the time of immediate crisis and in subsequent years.

For this reason, we have recently had several staff members trained in TIG—The Consortium on Trauma, Illness, and Grief in Schools, managed and supported through the Monroe County Office of Mental Health. Our staff were given training, support, and resources to better handle the challenging life circumstances that can impact our students, families, colleagues, and school community. By being knowledgeable and informed, we are better prepared to respond and intervene effectively during these times of crisis and to support resiliency.

Our classrooms are a kaleidoscope of students, all with ongoing needs for recognition, self-worth, empathy, and belonging. Because of this, the District makes every effort to continually review and support a strong character education program built on its core values: Be Respectful, Be Responsible, Be Accountable, and Be Your Best Self. Too often, schools can get caught up in the constant pressure to raise test scores and not have an inherent character development component in their curriculum. Not so at Byron-Bergen: we strive to ensure that our youngsters become the kind of quality, trustworthy human beings we all want them to be. *(continued on p. 2)*

SUPERINTENDENT'S Message

At a district level, we are keeping a careful eye on the finances of the State of New York. The economic condition of the state will have an impact on all school districts if revenues are reduced and/or eliminated. This makes our work extraordinarily challenging as we rely on state revenues for approximately \$13.5 million dollars in our annual school budget. The Byron-Bergen Central Schools Administrative Team and Board of Education are taking proactive steps in order to plan ahead for any shortfalls.

SRO's Corner

Good News! The Teen Sheriff's Academy (TSA) has been fully approved and will be held this summer, the week of July 23, 2018 at the Byron-Bergen Central School District. In case anyone missed the previous *Focal Point* where I discussed the TSA at length, this will be another brief intro with more details about the selection process.



The Teen Sheriff's Academy is a free, week-long course where selected students get a hands-on education in what it is like to become a police officer in an academy environment, and what it is like to be an actual police officer. For example, students participate in class lectures in penal law, vehicle and traffic law, and criminal procedure law; view demonstrations from the Emergency Response, SCUBA, K-9, and Hostage Negotiator teams; and perform daily physical fitness and team building exercises. There will also be tours of the Sheriff's Office, 911 Center, and the jail. Upon successful completion of the TSA, students have a graduation ceremony, receive certificates, and enjoy a barbequestyle lunch on the final day. Students are required to provide their own transportation to and from the academy and to bring their own lunch during the week.

The first step in the TSA selection process is for the applicant's school to determine who is eligible to apply based upon established criteria. Applications can be picked up in the Byron-Bergen counseling office or in my office. The deadline for submitting the application is March 31, 2018.

If the individual's application is accepted and meets the criteria for an interview, the next step is an oral interview. Students will be notified by their school and an interview will be set up with deputies from the Genesee County Sheriff's Office. An interview with the Sheriff's Office is not a guarantee that you will be selected for one of the Teen Sheriff's Academy weeks.

Based upon the individual's application, essay, and interview, the Sheriff and other deputies determine who is selected to the academy. It is important to keep in mind that this is a competitive process for students throughout Genesee County. There will only be a limited number of students accepted into the academy, so please do not get discouraged if your application is not accepted. The Sheriff's Office highly encourages applicants to keep applying to the program.

This program will be a great opportunity for our area students to gain knowledge and experience in the world of law enforcement. If there are any questions you can contact me at (585) 494–1220, ext. 2304.

Jr./Sr. High School Happenings

It is hard to believe we are already halfway through the year. I am so proud of the hard work of our students and staff. The positivity that runs through our building day in and day out

is so refreshing. We have truly become an awesome team. That is due to all of our stakeholders who believe in working together for what's best for kids.

You may notice a familiar face when you enter our building. I am so pleased to tell you that Christine Stevens (2015 graduate of B-B) will serve as our new Jr./Sr. High School secretary. Christine has already done an amazing job acclimating herself into her role in our building and I know all of you will be happy with her positive demeanor and great attitude. Hiring is one of the most important parts of my job. Hiring former graduates who fit into our culture is important to the positive culture we continue to cultivate.

Over the last six years, our district has prided itself on the great work we have done with character education. Specifically we have seen our Violent and Disruptive Incidents (offenses resulting in suspension) decrease from over 180 suspensions in 2011 to just around 40 last school year. We have also seen a sharp decline in the number of bullying incidents and repeat offenders during this time frame. This is due to a team effort and a formal process for investigating any incidents that are reported to us. While we are in a very good place, I recognize that we need to keep the foot on the gas pedal.

Over the last year, our character education team has worked diligently to identify core values that we want our learning community to live by. These core values consist of being respectful, responsible, accountable, and being our very best self. Over the remainder of the year, we will be rolling these core values out to students, staff, and our learning community. Our goal is to live and breathe each of these core values each and every day in all facets of our school. These core values will be integrated into everything we do from the classroom to the hallways to athletics to extra-curricular activities. We will also continue to focus on important skills such as digital citizenship, resilience, and other coping skills that we feel are necessary to helping kids be successful. Please check out our building website page over the next few months for updates to our character education program.

One thing we strive to do for our students is to offer as many instructional opportunities as we can. I am pleased with the progress we have made over the last few years in adding over 15 programs and electives to our course catalog. Next school year we will be adding an AP World History to our Advanced Placement program. We will also be adding a Painting and Drawing course for GCC credit. Over the next few months, our counselors will be doing scheduling with our students. Please feel free to set up an appointment or call us with any questions or feedback with this process. Also any parents of high school students: I encourage you to check out our recent presentation for college and career planning located on the Jr./Sr. High School webpage. This is another useful tool to help you be proactive in the planning of your son's or daughter's future.

One program we started this school year was an Agriculture Program. We began with an elective, Agricultural Explorations, and hope to add other electives in the coming years. This past December, we were officially approved as an FFA chapter. A big thank you to our Agriculture teacher Jeff Parnapy, who has been a big advocate for agricultural education in our school. We are also excited to announce that recently we received a \$5,000 grant from Cornell University to help support and grow our agriculture program. Some of the other opportunities our students will have include participating in the Environmental Leadership and Developmental program at Camp Oswegatchie, and other New York State FFA activities in the spring.

Our students in the musical, "Carnival!" have been working extremely hard over the last few months. There is so much to be said for the talent we have in our school. I am so proud to work in a district where these programs are recognized and highlighted. I encourage everyone to come out and see our show in March. It is going to be a special one! Speaking of the arts, I would like to give a big shout out to seventh-grader Zoey Shepard. Zoey's anti-DWI poster was selected as a Genesee County first prize winner and featured on a billboard in Batavia.

Get involved in our Liberty Scholars Program

The Liberty Partnerships Program (LPP) is a New York State Department of Education grant-funded program administered through Genesee Community College that has been in existence since 1989. It is a 12-month academic retention, career/college development, and cultural enrichment program provided at no cost to select identified students in grades 5-12 in the Byron-Bergen Central School District.

Liberty Scholars get help with homework, daily lunch opportunities, and after-school mentoring. They complete leadership and community service projects, with the assistance of Program Counselor, Samantha Golden. She supplements and assists our teachers, staff, and counselors with helping students reach their full potential, academically, socially, and emotionally.

This year, Liberty Scholars had the opportunity to participate in many exciting trips and activities, including an overnight tour to Gettysburg, PA.

College and career awareness is also an important aspect of the program. The Career Summer Institute at Genesee Valley BOCES allows students to gain first-hand knowledge in the fields of Culinary Arts and Animal Science. A one-week theatre arts camp at the Harvester Theatre in Batavia gives students a chance to learn about the many careers in the performing arts. They even participate in a Careers-in-Healthcare camp (PULSE Academy), facilitated through the WNY Rural Area Health Education Center – all services and enrichment opportunities are provided for free to the district as well as to selected program participants.

Many seniors have submitted their college applications and are beginning to hear decisions from their chosen colleges and universities. Our Financial Aid Night at Byron-Bergen and new FAFSA Night at the Gillam Grant Center were valuable in promoting the importance of financial aid literacy and FAFSA completion. All seniors planning to attend college should complete their FAFSA to ensure they receive a financial aid package.

Many seniors will continue to fill out applications for outside scholarships in the coming months. In a similar format, the sophomore class will be attending the Sophomore Career Day at SUNY Geneseo to gain exposure to over 30 career fields.

Our junior high school students are also beginning to explore their personal and career interests in the College and Career Center. Our hope is to have students identify their interests at an earlier age to help make more informed decisions in the future. The future is exciting and full of opportunity. We hope that each student leaves Byron-Bergen feeling the same way!





Byron-Bergen High School wins Cornell grant for new Agriculture Program

It has been over 40 years since Byron-Bergen Jr./Sr. High School had an agriculture program, but that's changed. A new introduction to agriculture class was launched this fall, along with a new FFA chapter. The school has also been awarded an Agriculture Education Incentive Grant for New and Growing Programs from Cornell University.

"It was time to restart the Ag program here," said Superintendent Mickey Edwards. "We have a great Cornell Ag-certified teacher who is enthusiastic about building the program. We have experienced community members who were ready to step up and be part of our Advisory Committee. We have students who wanted the opportunity to learn and get involved. The question was only 'when can we start?""

"Mr. Parnapy and our advisory team have done a great job getting this off the ground," said Jr./Sr. High School Principal Patrick McGee. "We believe we have the right pieces to have a top notch Ag education program."

Ag teacher Jeff Parnapy taught agriculture for eight years at Albion and New Berlin schools before coming to

Byron-Bergen as a science teacher in 2000. He says that a good Ag program must include three components: classroom instruction, leadership development events through FFA, and supervised work experience.

"We're starting slowly, with an Agriculture Exploration class that is an elective for students in grades 9–12," he said. "It covers a variety of topics, including soils and water, plant science and growth, animal science, methods of production, mechanical, small engines and fuel systems, and construction. We're planning several field trips, including one to the NYS FFA convention in Rochester this spring, and a chance to attend FFA Camp at Oswegatchie this summer."

Twenty students are in this first class. Many already have a strong interest in agriculture, participate in 4H, or come from families involved in the field. Some are interested in Genesee Valley BOCES programs in construction, conservation, animal science, or agribusiness and may use this as a stepping stone to further their career development.

"In two years, we hope to add another class in animal science or agricultural mechanics," said Parnapy, "depending on student interest and input from our Advisory Committee."

The school's Advisory Committee includes expert volunteers from the community: several grain and vegetable crop farmers, a veterinarian, an agronomist, and a hobby farmer. They provide planning guidance now, and hope to increase their involvement as speakers, mentors, and resources as the program grows.

Universal Prekindergarten

The Byron-Bergen School District hopes to once again offer a half-day Universal Prekindergarten (UPK) program for the 2018-19 school year. The class will be held at the Byron-Bergen Elementary School which is located at 6971 West Bergen Road, Bergen, NY 14416.

Students eligible for the program must turn four years of age by Dec. 1, 2018. If you have a child eligible and are interested in having him/her attend our UPK program, please send a letter of interest with your child's name, parents' names, address, phone number, and date of birth to: Brian Meister, Elementary School Principal, 6971 West Bergen Rd., Bergen, NY 14416, **by Friday, April 6, 2018**. Parents who have already contacted the Elementary School by phone will still need to send in a letter to be eligible for UPK. Please note that if we receive more than our allowed capacity, we will select students using a lottery system.

What are the Program Goals of the UPK at Byron-Bergen?

- To meet the NYS learning standards by using a curriculum that is thematically based and supported using literature, songs, and exploration.
- To foster an environment that promotes happy, confident children who are willing to take risks, make independent choices, and ask questions.
- To create an inclusive community that builds upon the student's strengths and accommodates their needs.

Philosophy of UPK

The UPK program at Byron-Bergen is focused on socialization, learning through play, and self-exploration. Children learn through a hands-on learning environment that includes activities, learning centers, concrete materials, and manipulatives. Students learn through a nurturing environment that is enriching, challenging, and developmentally appropriate.



KINDERGARTEN REGISTRATION REMINDER

Children who will be five years of age, on or before Dec. 1, 2018, are eligible for entrance to Kindergarten in September of 2018. New families in the school district should notify the school if they have a child who will enter Kindergarten in September of 2018. Parents may contact the Byron-Bergen Elementary School Office by calling (585) 494-1220, ext. 1301. Information may also be sent to the Byron-Bergen Elementary School, 6971 West Bergen Road, Bergen, New York 14416.

All children registering for Kindergarten will be scheduled for a screening appointment this summer. The results of this screening will be used to plan for the 2018-19 Kindergarten Program.

The following items are necessary to complete the registration process:

- 1. Your child's Birth Certificate.
- 2. Certificate of Immunization— New York State law requires that every child entering school must have received a minimum of 5 doses of diphtheriapertussis-tetanus vaccine (DPT) and 4 doses of polio (IPV) vaccine, 2 doses of MMR (measles, mumps, rubella), 3 doses of Hepatitis B, and 2 doses of varicella (chickenpox). Those children born on or after 1/1/2008 must have 4 doses of Pneumococcal Conjugate Vaccine (PCV). Their immunizations must be completed prior to entering school.
- **3. Proof of Residency** If this is the first time you have a child entering Byron-Bergen Central School District, please bring proof of residency to your screening appointment. This can be a copy of your mortgage statement, rental/lease agreement or a copy of your tax bill.

Since September, I have implemented the Too Good for Drugs and Too Good for Violence programs in the eighth-grade FACS classes with the fifth-and sixthgrade elementary students. Both of these are evidence-based programs that promote positive, pro-social attitudes and behavior while fostering healthy relationships, resistance to substance abuse and conflict, and resistance to negative peer pressure and influence. It was a pleasure to implement these programs with such a great group of students.

Byron-Bergen students celebrated Red Ribbon Week from October 23-31, 2017. Red Ribbon Week is a national drug prevention campaign that focuses on educating communities about the dangers of alcohol and other drugs. This year, I was able to work with staff members Maureen Calmes and Samantha Golden to create a fun and educational awareness campaign. This campaign educated students on the dangers of drug use, misuse and abuse. The students volunteered to write down their "key to success" on a paper key and enjoyed posing for their "drug-free" selfies. Both the keys to success and selfies were displayed in the Elementary School and Jr./Sr. High School.

I have also had the opportunity to work with the SADD (Students Against Destructive Decisions) group. These students are enthusiastic and very motivated to help make a positive difference in their school.


Upcoming activities and events include:

- I'll be presenting the Red Watch Band Training to all seniors. Red Watch Band is a national grassroots program designed to teach students how to recognize the signs of alcohol poisoning as well as toxic drinking and provide them with the tools to take action.
- Prom is right around the corner, and it's important for our Prevention Team to inform and educate students on the dangers associated with substance use. We strive to explain that prom is a fun time, but we want to provide information in hopes of preventing dangerous situations.
- GCASA is now offering a program called Hidden Mischief...In Plain

Sight. This program is designed to create awareness about ways teens conceal drugs or use everyday items for drug use. The interactive teen bedroom will give each participant an opportunity to search and find drug paraphernalia, drugs, and drug references. There will be everyday items displayed that have been converted to hide or use drugs. In addition, it will create an awareness of the possibilities of how easy these items can be purchased over the internet or at local venues.

It has been an absolute pleasure to work with the Byron-Bergen students and staff, and I look forward to the upcoming months. Being able to spread awareness and educate the school community about the dangers of alcohol and other drugs and to reduce the risk factors associated with substance use and abuse is important to our Prevention team at GCASA.
