#### **Budget and School Board election results**

It is with the utmost gratitude that I am announcing that next year's budget was passed by a vote of 259 to 239. Our proposal to purchase two buses was supported 309 to 155. The two 3-year terms on the Board of Education went to incumbents Debi List and Bill Forsyth. I congratulate these individuals and look forward to working with them as we continue to challenge, engage, and nurture our students.

#### Strategic Plan

Strategic planning is intended to accomplish three important goals. The first is to clarify the outcomes that the District wishes to achieve; the second is to select the broad strategies that will enable the organization to achieve those outcomes; and the third is to identify ways to measure progress on these strategies. Included in this edition of the Focal Point is Byron-Bergen's new Strategic Plan, named Creating Leaders One Student at a Time. This five-year plan was adopted at the June 1 Board of Education meeting and was the culmination of many stakeholders' work spanning the past year. This work included gathering feedback from all facets of the school and the greater community through interviews, surveys, and focus groups. 
Walton is looking forward to an active retirement. Her plans include spending more time with family and friends, hiking, biking, and traveling.

## New WNY Video Recording Coaching Institute to launch from Byron-Bergen CSD this fall

Teachers throughout the region will have a new professional development resource, thanks to a collaboration between the Genesee Valley Educational Partnership (GVEP) and the Byron-Bergen Central School District. The Western New York Video Recording Coaching Institute will incorporate a proven video coaching model with a groundbreaking virtual classroom simulator, TeachLivETM, which allows educators to develop and improve their teaching practice in a safe environment.

The new institute will be headed by Executive Director Jim Thompson, who has led the development of BBCSD's own successful Instructional Coaching initiative since 2013. He and Byron-Bergen's Superintendent of Schools Casey Kosiorek recently presented at the National TeachLivE Conference at the University of Central Florida to educators from across the country, there to learn about this innovative approach to professional development.

supporting the Institute's vision. "Mr. MacDonald has shown unwavering support for this initiative, and his support has made this a reality," he said. "This is a great approach to support teachers in becoming the best they can be. We are very excited to be hosting it here, and helping to make these services available to teachers in our entire area. Ultimately, this is a huge benefit, not just for the teachers, but also for all of their students."

TeachLivE is a computer-simulated, mixed-reality classroom. Teachers step into this virtual classroom and within a minute experience immersion and suspension of disbelief, allowing them to rehearse high-leverage teaching practices related to student achievement. Much like a flight simulator for pilots, TeachLivE simulates a classroom experience for teachers to hone their skills. The tool will be combined with individual coaching, role-playing, model lessons, and videotaping of lessons. The Institute's program is designed to guide teachers, using a style that is highly interactive, supportive, and reflective.

"Everyone can get better; this is not just for new teachers, or superstars," said Kosiorek."No matter where a teacher is, they can be better. We'd like to see every teacher at Byron-Bergen get involved in Instructional Coaching within the next three years."

As the building principal, I have the advantage of a broader-based perspective on this topic, which gives me the pleasure of taking note of the finergrained accomplishments of our students. Although I cannot possibly capture all of the outstanding actions of our pupils, please allow me to highlight a few recent and special student attainments that you may have missed...

#### Two Eagle Scouts awarded—

This spring two of our students were recognized for earning the highest achievement rank in the Boy Scouts organization. On average, only seven percent of all Scouts reach this pinnacle annually and we have two! With Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) becoming one of the fastestgrowing career pathways, students like this are creating the foundational footing for a successful future in a competitive new 21st-century job market.

Student earns first ever two-time recognition—Every year the Genesee County Youth Bureau recognizes community service in the local area at their Youth Recognition Banquet. At no time during the history of this award has a student ever been nominated and recognized twice. Over the past few years, Class of 2015 Valedictorian Michaela Kenward has worked with her mother and several other school and community volunteers to create a self-sustaining backpack program and community food pantry in our school District. Based on her selfless and tireless efforts to assist others in need, Michaela earned her second Youth Recognition Award as a Byron-Bergen student. Congratulations Michaela and best of luck in your future endeavors. I know you will go on to accomplish great things!

This year was the final stage of implementation for Project Lead the Way (PLTW) courses in our Technology Department. Students taking PLTW courses have the ability to earn Rochester Institute of Technology (RIT) credits while in high school as they successfully complete each course and score highly on the PLTW exam. Engineering Design and Development (EDD) is the program's capstone course that enables students to acquire industry-like experience by showcasing their engineering knowledge and skills to identify an issue and then to research, design, and test a solution. On June 3, seniors Nick Kelly and Michael Shanley were the first from B-B

to present their project of a "compact adaptable lift" to a panel of local practitioners and engineers. The team was graded in four domains: problem selection and research, project construction, testing/ real data/conclusion, and presentation effectiveness. Congratulations to Nick and Mike on a successful presentation. Both students exemplify the District's vision to "provide all students with a rigorous, well rounded educational experience." Nice work, gentlemen!

As a point of pride, our building focused this year on two important factors that indicate a school's organizational health: student attendance and discipline. It is my pleasure to share with you the fruits of our school communities' efforts in both of these arenas. For the fifth year in a row, student discipline problems continued to significantly drop as defined by New York State's Violent and Disruptive Incident Report. During the 2010-11 school year our students committed 182 violent and/ or disruptive disciplinary infractions; this year (2014-15) that number continued to decline at a constant rate resulting in a total of only 50 infractions. In 2010 we set an aspirational attendance goal of 95% or better as a building. Including the

I am equally excited by the potential that a new College and Career Center will bring. This physical space and additional guidance counselor will help students to unlock their true college and career potential beginning in seventh grade. The trusting relationships developed here will provide students and families with a guide to assist in building a long-range plan wrapped around students' individual skills and interests. Our vision is for every student to establish one or two inspirational college/career goals by their sophomore year. Students who have a clear vision for the future are more highly motivated and will work harder to make it a reality, especially if they are personally invested in the process.

## Woodworking experts give hands-on lessons

Byron-Bergen students received hands-on lessons from a group of master craftsmen in the Sr. High School's Manufacturing Systems class. Finger Lakes Wood Turners Club members Jerry Sheridan, Rich Connelly, Dave Harp, Dave Leupold, Gary Russell, Harry Beaver, Mike Brawley, and Denis Caysinger were guests in the class from March through May 2015. Sheridan, a past Byron-Bergen Board of Education Trustee, is a talented woodworker and avid wood turner. He recruited several members of his Club to volunteer their time by coming to Byron-Bergen to share their expertise with students using wood lathes.

Sheridan first spoke to the students about safety and proper techniques for turning wood, and then proceeded to demonstrate his skills to the class. He and the other guests displayed several of their finished pieces, such as bowls, spinning tops, Christmas ornaments, and decorative spindles. Each member had a favorite type of turning project they focused on, and each showed how to hold the cutting tools in order to create different shapes and effects on the wood. They also demonstrated the procedure for sharpening cutting tools and discussed the safe use of these tools on the wood lathe.

This is Sheridan's sixth year sharing his expertise in wood turning at Byron-Bergen, but the third year in which he recruited other members from the Club to work with students on the lathes. The turners brought their own minilathes and turning tools with them to add to the experience. Many turning tools have been donated by club members over the past few years to add to the quality of the experience for our students.

The Wood Turners members say they welcome the opportunity to share knowledge of their craft with others and complimented our students for being so respectful and willing to learn. Students came away from this two-month project with lessons learned and unique pieces of their own. Some students presented their own "creations" at a Board of Education meeting on May 7. Sheridan also announced at that time that a grant was received from the National Wood Turners Association to help pay for the purchase of new turning equipment for our program at B-B.

Over the years, the Finger Lakes Wood Turners Club has made many wooden toys and has regularly donated to the Golisano Children's Hospital. Members provide educational demonstrations at their Club and throughout the region for various organizations and schools. We are very grateful to them for the time and knowledge they have shared with us here at Byron-Bergen.

# FOCAL POINT

Elementary students read 23,473 books since December—46 books per child

The Byron-Bergen Elementary School's Celebration of Reading Challenge began on December 5, 2014—students pledged to read 20,000 books before the school year ended. On May 28, the entire school population gathered to hear the results, delivered by teacher Debbie Slocum: just over 510 motivated young readers had exceeded their goal, reading a total of 23,473 books.

And the students' reward for all that reading? Inspired by the book "Stuck" by Oliver Jeffers, about an impossible tree where everything thrown into it gets stuck, Principal Brian Meister and Assistant Principal Amanda Cook promised to allow themselves to be duct taped to chairs during the assembly, and to wear clothes made of duct tape the next day. "It's a fun way to get students "stuck" on reading," said Meister. "It keeps them excited and wanting to read more, while the duct tape event itself is something they will always remember."

The Celebration of Reading is the brainchild of Byron-Bergen's English language arts (ELA) committee, which began the challenge in 2013 with a goal of reading 10,000 books (a target also exceeded by over 8,000). The assembly included guest speaker Nancy Bailey from the Bergen Public Library who invited the children to visit the library and to keep reading over the summer.

Selected readers from each grade level received new books to jumpstart their summers, some of which were signed by the authors or illustrators.

Teachers read selections from a few favorite books, complete with comic flourishes. Craig Schroth read from Mo Willems' "Knuffle Bunny;"Taylor Farruggia read from "Strega Nona" by Tomie DePaola; Heather Young entertained with "Alexander and the Terrible, Horrible, No Good, Very Bad Day" by Judith Viorst and Ray Cruz; and Daneen Williams read from "Miss Nelson is Missing" by Harry G. Allard, Jr. and James Marshall. Many other teachers participated in the event, including Nicole Newton, Mariah LaSpina, and Karen Tischer.

A highlight of the readings was a hip-hop version of the Dr. Seuss classic "Green Eggs and Ham" by teachers Ken Rogoyski and Megan Wahl, assisted by student Katherine Rogoyski as "Fox I Am." Students were also treated to a showing of the school's video "Read a Book" (based on Taylor Swift's song

"Shake It Off") which was produced at the beginning of the school year.

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## Byron-Bergen CSD designated a 2015 State School District of Character



The Byron-Bergen Central School District's emphasis on educating the whole student recently earned it a place on Character.org's annual list of State Schools and Districts of Character. These 80 schools and four districts from around the United States demonstrate a dedicated focus on character

development that has a true positive impact on academic achievement, student behavior, and school climate.

"This is a great honor for everyone in our District — from the students and parents to the teachers and administrators. They have all been united in their efforts to make our schools places where students can learn to be both intelligent and good citizens," said BBCSD Superintendent Casey Kosiorek. "I am so proud to see our school community recognized for their dedication and hard work."

BBCSD adopted a District-wide framework for character education in 2012 that teaches students about leadership, ethics, decision making, and respect. It centered on the District's core values, "Challenge, Engage, Nurture." The Olweus Bullying Prevention Program (www.violencepreventionworks.org) has since become an integral part of the education experience at all grade levels. "The Leader in Me" (www.theleaderinme.org), a

whole-school transformational model that uses Steven Covey's Seven Habits and gives students self-confidence and life skills, was also adopted in 2012.

The extensive School of Character application process was navigated by Amanda Cook and Patrick McGee, Assistant Principals at the Elementary and Jr./Sr. High Schools. "The process offered us the chance to reflect on our character education initiatives and identify areas of strength as well as opportunity," said Cook. "Their reviewers gave us feedback that will help us strengthen current practices using the 11 Principles of Character Education framed by Character.org."

The character education movement is a proactive effort to help students recognize, and then do, what's right. In schools of character, teachers work together as professionals, with parents and community members as partners. They positively shape the social, emotional, and character development of their students. Children in these schools feel safe, respected, and connected to those around them, allowing them to thrive academically and socially and be motivated to give back to their communities.

Character.org (www.character.org) is a national nonprofit based in Washington, D.C. that works with schools to inspire, educate, and empower young people to be ethical and engaged citizens.
