Euperintendent's Message

First and foremost, it is awesome to have all of our students (Pre-K-12) back in our buildings for full in-person instruction. The last year and a half have been difficult for our students and families, as well as our school staff. I am proud that everyone has settled in and school is off to a great start. My personal highlight has been seeing all of the excitement from our kids.

I want to thank all of our school community who came out to vote and help pass our upcoming Capital Project. This project covers areas across our whole District that are necessary for health and safety, maintaining and preserving our District assets, and enhancing programmatic opportunities for students and staff. As a reminder, there will be no additional tax increase to our taxpayers. The project will begin in the spring of 2023 and conclude in 2024. We will continue to update the community as plans unfold.

I wanted to reinforce the District's responsibility regarding COVID-19 cases. There is very little information that I am allowed to share regarding specific cases; however, I am required by NYS law to report daily positive cases of COVID-19 for staff and students to the Department of Health. The link below (also on our website) shows documented positive cases reported by the District and confirmed by the Department of Health in the Elementary and Jr./Sr. High School. 
Our Bees Did AMAZING Things This Fall!

Explorers Satisfies Students' Interest in Emergency Gervices

At a time when emergency service volunteers are in a 30-year decline, Byron-Bergen high school students are changing the statistics.

Izzy Best, GJ Donofrio, Lea Donofrio, Logan Fregoe, Rayden Robinson, Emma Starowitz, James (JC) Starowitz, and Rugar Starowitz are fulltime high school students. In addition to participating in sports, advanced placement classes, student government and part-time jobs, they also volunteer with Bergen Fire Departments in its Explorers program.

"The purpose of the Explorers program is to start educating teenagers about the fire service and EMS, hoping to inspire the next generation of first responders," said Julie Donofrio, Explorer Program Coordinator and EMT with the Bergen Fire Department. "Our current group of kids is interested in both the fire side and the EMT side of things, which is awesome, because they're learning how firefighting and EMT work as a team."

"My parents are part of the fire department and have been for a while, so it's kind of in my family," said Lea Donofrio. "I'm interested in working in EMS and rescue. I want to go into the Coast Guard and police afterwards. I know people who did Explorers in the past and once they obtained their EMT at age 17, they received a lot more benefits with their jobs and colleges, so I think it'll set me apart."

Students can earn experience from a lot of places, so why pick the Explorers? "It's a career path for a lot of kids," said Julie. "These kids have, in one way or another, grown-up in the fire service, and it just seems natural. This is just what they know." Something that makes this group of students stand out is that all of them are second or third generation firefighters or EMS. Julie herself has the pleasure of being able to teach and train her two children, GJ and Lea.

"GJ actually wasn't sure at all if he wanted to join, but both of my kids had been going to the hall and participating since they were little, so they were our guinea pigs," said Julie with a laugh. "Now that they realize it's kind of fun, they enjoy learning about the service and life skills."

The skills that students learn translate not only to the medical world, but to the "real world." They learn how to perform CPR, administer first aid and use the AED machine, which are all life skills. They also volunteer in the

community by bringing cookies to Bergen Meadows during the holidays, socializing with residents, and checking their blood pressure rates. "Students are interacting with the community, practicing skills, and spreading the word about the program," said Julie.

Julie said one of the best parts is seeing how engaged and motivated students are. She said that the District is instrumental in providing support and rustling up interest in the program. She often receives texts from parents, wondering when the next meeting is.

"The Explorers program is a great opportunity for our kids," said Julie. "The program has given kids first-hand experience in working with the Bergen Fire Department. These students really go above and beyond, and they are committed to giving back to our community. We are lucky to have this program in our school district."

If anyone – student or community member – is interested in joining the Explorers or volunteering with the department, Julie strongly encourages them to talk to one of the students that is currently involved, or head down to the Bergen Fire Department to find out more information.

Raising Money by Raising the Dead

When Byron-Bergen senior Libby Piper and her mom, Byron-Bergen teacher Heather Painting, went on local ghost tours, she thought, "Bergen could do this."

This year, Piper and Painting began planning a local historical ghost tour. They started by speaking to the Bergen Historical Society, who provided information about the people buried at Mount Rest Cemetery.

Next, it was finding actors to portray the former residents – so Piper decided to get the community involved.

"I thought it would be a great idea to involve the school in the Bergen community," said Piper. "Some of the drama students agreed to portray the people that are buried in the cemetery."

Prior to the event, the Town of Bergen and Mayor Anna Marie Barclay worked with Piper and Painting to organize an event in Hickory Park to complement the ghost tour. There were food trucks and performances by The Charlie Mitchell Group, and tickets to the ghost tours sold out even after adding additional tour slots. The front pavilion was decorated with Halloween ghosts and witches, Young Life sold pumpkins, studentmade scarecrows were displayed, proposals for park plantings were presented, Greg'ry's served baked goods, and ice cream treats were sold by the Methodist Church. Attendees had dinner,



enjoyed music, and went on the ghost tour. There were approximately 250 people in attendance, with between 90 and 100 people taking the tour.

"As a retired teacher, I am always looking for opportunities to work with students, include them in community activities, and bring the community together," said Barclay. "This seemed an opportunity to do so."

The event also ended up being a way to honor former village historian Ray MacConnell, who recently passed.

The historical ghost tour featured students and faculty members dressed as deceased members of the Bergen community who are buried in Mount Rest Cemetery in the village. The "ghosts" told stories of events in their lives as the "tourists" made their way through the cemetery. The stories they told were from MacConnell's writings and research.

Byron-Bergen Drama Teacher Larry Tallman participated as a ghost on the ghost tour. He took on the role of Eaton Mann, an eclectic Batavian photographer and musician.

"It was incredibly exciting to have that opportunity, to have a student take that initiative, and to come up with such a creative way to raise money," said Tallman. "It was even more exciting for me to be a part of the whole thing as an actor and being directed by my student."

Piper and Barclay have heard nothing but positive feedback and are looking forward to expanding the event for next year with more ghosts, tour slots, and community involvement.

"Just yesterday, Mr. McGee stopped me in the hallway and told me he's heard nothing but great things about it, so that was really great for me to hear," said Piper. "I've received lots and lots of positive feedback about it."

Due to the huge amount of input and effort, Piper decided that the proceeds from the ghost tours and festival would be donated to the Byron-Bergen drama department, the Cemetery Association, and the Bergen Historical Society. In its first year, the event raised \$900.

I am looking forward to working with the SEL Teams and all of the amazing opportunities to come this year to support students, staff and families.



Pesticide Notice

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation enacted a program that requires all schools to provide you with information about pesticide product applications made throughout the school year. Under State law, the school is required to maintain a list of parents, guardians, and staff who wish to receive 48-hour advance written notice prior to a pesticide application. The Following pesticide applications are not subject to prior notification requirements:

· A school remains unoccupied for a continuous 72-hours following an application;

- · Anti-microbial products;
- · Nonvolatile rodenticides in tamper resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children:
- · Silica gels and other nonvolatile ready-to-eat pastes, forms, or gels in areas inaccessible to children:
- · Boric acid and disodium octaborate tetrahydrate;
- · The application of EPA designated biopesticides;
- · The application of EPA designated exempt materials under 40CFR.25:

 The use of aerosol products with a directed spray in containers of 18 fluid ounces or less when used to protect individuals.

In the event that an emergency application is necessary to protect against an imminent threat to human health, a good faith effort will be made to supply written notification to those on the 48-hour prior notification list. To register your name with the school to be on a 48-hour notification list, send a request to Byron-Bergen Central School District Office, 6917 W Bergen Rd., Bergen, NY 14416. A written request must be submitted annually.
